










Funding comes from three sources

Purpose

Minn. Stat. 414.01 - Goals of Municipal Development


[OAH] may **promote** and **regulate** development of cities:

(1) to provide for the extension of municipal government to areas which are developed or are in the process of being developed for intensive use for residential, commercial, industrial, institutional, and governmental purposes or are needed for such purposes; and




(3) to **protect the integrity of land use planning** in municipalities and unincorporated areas so that the public interest in efficient local government will be properly recognized and served.





- > 70% of all mediations at OAH result in agreement by parties.


Hearings

- Hearings are held in the county where most of the affected land is located.
- Notice of hearing is published.
- An owner may represent a group of owners.
- Any person may present facts or evidence at the hearing without becoming a party.



Annexation by Ordinance

- City council passes an ordinance declaring land a part of the city.
- May be used to annex abutting property that is:
 - 1. City-owned;
 - 2. Surrounded by the city;
 - Abutting the city, under 120 acres, and it is not served by public wastewater, at property owner's request;
 - 4. Less than 40 acres and at least 60 bordered by the city; or
 - 5. By petition of a majority of property owners (some land size limitations).
- May also be used for platted lots averaging 21,780 square feet and within two miles of the city.

Orderly Annexation

- By joint resolution, a city and township may agree that a designated area needs orderly annexation.
- Notice of the agreement must be published at least ten days before adoption of the resolution.
- Property does not need to abut the city.
- Can be used for immediate or future annexations.
- The orderly annexation agreement is a binding contract.

Concurrent Detachment/Annexation

- Abutting property is simultaneously detached from one city and annexed to another city.
- Initiated by:
 - Resolution of both cities; or
 - Petition by the property owner and resolution of one city.
- If both cities don't agree, set for hearing.
- Annexation is ordered if it is in the best interests of the cities and property owner.

Judge's Order

- If other types of annexation do not apply, annexation can be approved after a hearing.
- Initiated by:
 - City;
 - Township;
 - · City and township together; or
 - 20% of the property owners or 100 owners, whichever is less, in the area to be annexed.
- Set for a hearing.
- Best-interest analysis applies.

WHAT WE DO

The Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) renders justice through fair, timely, and impartial administrative hearings and high-quality dispute resolution services.

OAH is the largest of Minnesota's three Executive Branch courts, with over 60 employees located in St. Paul and Duluth serving the entire state of Minnesota.



WORKERS' COMPENSATION

Judges preside over settlement and trial-level proceedings regarding disputed claims for workers' compensation benefits. More than 10,000 disputes involving over 7,500 workers are filed each year. Over 70% of all disputes are resolved through settlement.



ADMINISTRATIVE LAW

Judges preside over cases involving challenges to state and local government action, including utility rates and routes, professional and business licenses, data privacy, environmental permits, special education, and campaign practice complaints. Since 1976, Administrative Law Judges have served over 250 state agencies and heard cases involving over 200 unique areas of administrative law.



RULEMAKING

Judges review regulatory rules proposed by state agencies to determine whether they are necessary, reasonable, and comply with state law. The public and interested stakeholders can comment on proposed rules online, in writing or in person at hearings across the state. Judges reviewed almost 200 rulemaking matters in the past biennium.



BOUNDARY ADJUSTMENTS

Judges determine the boundaries of cities and towns throughout Minnesota in annexations, detachments, consolidations, and related planning proceedings. Boundary adjustment requests come from property owners, cities, or townships. In the past biennium, 264 boundary adjustment requests were filed.
