Ottertail Through direct financial support for paid summer internships, SHCIP seeks to continue addressing health care workforce shortages by introducing secondary and postsecondary students to careers in health Verndale care in a non-classroom environment dedicated to their learning. SCHIP helps fund at least one-half the Wadena costs of employing the secondary and postsecondary summer health care interns working in hospitals, clinics, nursing facilities and home care providers. This is a valuable resource as health care

HOSPITAIganizations continue to suffer financially from increased costs, such as workforce and continuing Wadena impacts from COVID-19.

Astera Health, formally known as Tri-County Health Care, has participated in SHCIP and has employed multiple interns over the years we have participated in the program. SHCIP interns at our care facilities directly engage with the care process by shadowing a multitude of departments, both patient and nonpatient facing. This opportunity gives students a valuable insight into the health care field and helps to develop interest in the field from an early age. Our facility greatly benefits from this program as we are able to engage local students from surrounding counties, earn early interest, and even open the door to job opportunities upon graduation. We have first hand experience of this program being beneficial to us, as we have had previous SHCIP students return for clinical rotations while in their medical programs at the college level. This program not only helps us, but also benefits our surrounding colleges as students will go on to study nursing, information technology, health care administration, coding, and many more programs.

The Minnesota Department of Employment and Economic Development (DEED) currently estimates over 50,000 open health care jobs across our state. This is a crisis, and it is not sustainable for the care that all Minnesotans deserve. Multiple steps must be taken at the legislature to address this shortage, including increased funding for SHCIP.

We urge you and this Committee to support HF 2090 (Reyer) and increase the ability of Astera Health to foster interest amongst our states secondary and postsecondary students in pursuing a health care career and expand the pipeline for Minnesota's health care workforce.
