1.10 **(a) Culturally Specific Recovery**
1.11 **Community Organization Start-Up Grants.**

1.12 \$4,000,000 in fiscal year 2024 is for culturally
1.13 specific recovery community organization
1.14 start-up grants. Notwithstanding Minnesota
1.15 Statutes, section 16A.28, this appropriation is
1.16 available until June 30, 2027. This is a onetime
1.17 appropriation.

1.18 **(b) Safe Recovery Sites.** \$14,537,000 in fiscal
1.19 year 2024 is from the general fund for start-up
1.20 and capacity-building grants for organizations
1.21 to establish safe recovery sites.
1.22 Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes, section
1.23 16A.28, this appropriation is onetime and is
1.24 available until June 30, 2029.

2.1 **(c) Technical Assistance for Culturally**
2.2 **Specific Organizations; Culturally Specific**
2.3 **Services Grants.** \$4,000,000 in fiscal year
2.4 2024 is for grants to culturally specific
2.5 providers for technical assistance navigating
2.6 culturally specific and responsive substance
2.7 use and recovery programs. Notwithstanding
2.8 Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.28, this
2.9 appropriation is available until June 30, 2027.

2.10 **(d) Technical Assistance for Culturally**
2.11 **Specific Organizations; Culturally Specific**
2.12 **Grant Development Training.** \$400,000 in
2.13 fiscal year 2024 is for grants for up to four
2.14 trainings for community members and
2.15 culturally specific providers for grant writing
2.16 training for substance use and recovery-related
2.17 grants. Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes,
2.18 section 16A.28, this is a onetime appropriation
2.19 and is available until June 30, 2027.

2.20 **(e) Harm Reduction Supplies for Tribal and**
2.21 **Culturally Specific Programs.** \$7,597,000
2.22 in fiscal year 2024 is from the general fund to
2.23 provide sole source grants to culturally
2.24 specific communities to purchase syringes,
2.25 testing supplies, and opiate antagonists.
2.26 Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes, section
2.27 16A.28, this appropriation is available until
2.28 June 30, 2027. This is a onetime appropriation.

2.29 **(f) Families and Family Treatment**
2.30 **Capacity-Building and Start-Up Grants.**
2.31 \$10,000,000 in fiscal year 2024 is from the
2.32 general fund for start-up and capacity-building
2.33 grants for family substance use disorder
2.34 treatment programs. Notwithstanding
2.35 Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.28, this

3.1 appropriation is available until June 30, 2029.

3.2 This is a onetime appropriation.

3.3 **(g) Start-Up and Capacity Building Grants**
3.4 **for Withdrawal Management.** \$500,000 in
3.5 fiscal year 2024 and \$1,000,000 in fiscal year
3.6 2025 are for start-up and capacity building
3.7 grants for withdrawal management.

3.8 **(h) Recovery Community Organization**
3.9 **Grants.** \$4,300,000 in fiscal year 2024 is from
3.10 the general fund for grants to recovery
3.11 community organizations, as defined in
3.12 Minnesota Statutes, section 254B.01,
3.13 subdivision 8, that are current grantees as of
3.14 June 30, 2023. This is a onetime appropriation
3.15 and is available until June 30, 2025.

3.16 **(i) Opioid Overdose Prevention Grants.**
3.17 (1) \$125,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$125,000
3.18 in fiscal year 2025 are from the general fund
3.19 for a grant to Ka Joog, a nonprofit organization
3.20 in Minneapolis, Minnesota, to be used for
3.21 collaborative outreach, education, and training
3.22 on opioid use and overdose, and distribution
3.23 of opiate antagonist kits in East African and
3.24 Somali communities in Minnesota. This is a
3.25 onetime appropriation.

3.26 (2) \$125,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$125,000
3.27 in fiscal year 2025 are from the general fund
3.28 for a grant to the Steve Rummeler Hope
3.29 Network to be used for statewide outreach,
3.30 education, and training on opioid use and
3.31 overdose, and distribution of opiate antagonist
3.32 kits. This is a onetime appropriation.

3.33 (3) \$250,000 in fiscal year 2024 and \$250,000
3.34 in fiscal year 2025 are from the general fund

4.1 for a grant to African Career Education and
4.2 Resource, Inc. to be used for collaborative
4.3 outreach, education, and training on opioid
4.4 use and overdose, and distribution of opiate
4.5 antagonist kits. This is a onetime
4.6 appropriation.

4.7 **(j) Problem Gambling.** \$225,000 in fiscal
4.8 year 2024 and \$225,000 in fiscal year 2025
4.9 are from the lottery prize fund for a grant to a
4.10 state affiliate recognized by the National
4.11 Council on Problem Gambling. The affiliate
4.12 must provide services to increase public
4.13 awareness of problem gambling, education,
4.14 training for individuals and organizations that
4.15 provide effective treatment services to problem
4.16 gamblers and their families, and research
4.17 related to problem gambling.

4.18 **(k) Project ECHO.** \$1,310,000 in fiscal year
4.19 2024 and \$1,295,000 in fiscal year 2025 are
4.20 from the general fund for a grant to Hennepin
4.21 Healthcare to expand the Project ECHO
4.22 program. The grant must be used to establish
4.23 at least four substance use disorder-focused
4.24 Project ECHO programs at Hennepin
4.25 Healthcare, expanding the grantee's capacity
4.26 to improve health and substance use disorder
4.27 outcomes for diverse populations of
4.28 individuals enrolled in medical assistance,
4.29 including but not limited to immigrants,
4.30 individuals who are homeless, individuals
4.31 seeking maternal and perinatal care, and other
4.32 underserved populations. The Project ECHO
4.33 programs funded under this section must be
4.34 culturally responsive, and the grantee must
4.35 contract with culturally and linguistically

5.1 appropriate substance use disorder service
5.2 providers who have expertise in focus areas,
5.3 based on the populations served. Grant funds
5.4 may be used for program administration,
5.5 equipment, provider reimbursement, and
5.6 staffing hours. This is a onetime appropriation
5.7 and is available until June 30, 2027.

5.8 **(l) White Earth Nation Substance Use**
5.9 **Disorder Digital Therapy Tool.** \$3,000,000
5.10 in fiscal year 2024 is from the general fund
5.11 for a grant to the White Earth Nation to
5.12 develop an individualized Native American
5.13 centric digital therapy tool with Pathfinder
5.14 Solutions. This is a onetime appropriation.

5.15 The grant must be used to:

5.16 (1) develop a mobile application that is
5.17 culturally tailored to connecting substance use
5.18 disorder resources with White Earth Nation
5.19 members;

5.20 (2) convene a planning circle with White Earth
5.21 Nation members to design the tool;

5.22 (3) provide and expand White Earth
5.23 Nation-specific substance use disorder
5.24 services; and

5.25 (4) partner with an academic research
5.26 institution to evaluate the efficacy of the
5.27 program.

5.28 **(m) Wellness in the Woods.** \$300,000 in
5.29 fiscal year 2024 and \$300,000 in fiscal year
5.30 2025 are from the general fund for a grant to
5.31 Wellness in the Woods for daily peer support
5.32 and special sessions for individuals who are
5.33 in substance use disorder recovery, are
5.34 transitioning out of incarceration, or who have

6.1 experienced trauma. These are onetime
6.2 appropriations.

6.3 (n) **Base Level Adjustment.** The general fund
6.4 base is \$3,247,000 in fiscal year 2026 and
6.5 \$3,247,000 in fiscal year 2027."
