To break the cycle of Family Homelessness by providing safe and secure housing, and a warm and welcoming community that keeps the well-being of children at the center of community life.


We surround children and parents with support as they recover from adversity. We focus on health and wellness, lifelong learning and rebuilding social networks.



Outcomes & Outputs

Serving 80 children and 60 parents each year

100% of families receive intensive case management with family coaches. 35% of families have lived at Steve O'Neil more than 4 years; 43% have been there between 2 and 4 years

80% of young children participate in Trauma-Informed Early Childhood Programs.

75% of youth participate in after-school tutoring and mentoring.

100% of children receive support during and after out-of-home placement.





Keeping Families Together...

All SONA families are at risk for child welfare involvement.


In 2017, we had 29 children in out-of-home placement that involved 1/3 of our families.

In 2018, we had 21 children in out-of-home placement and 18 open cases with Child Protection Services.

In 2020, we had 8 open cases with Child Protection Services, and 4 children in out-of-home placement.
