Summary of key responses during COVID-19

Key Strategies

- Guidance and technical assistance to homeless providers (shelters, outreach, public health)
- Funding for shelter decompression, encampment responses and other settings
- Ensure adequate isolation space for people without a safe place to recover on their own
- Proactive distribution of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)
- Extensive engagement of provider community including 1-on-1 technical assistance, newsletters, and weekly webinars

Major Accomplishments

- Working with local partners to create over 2,800 temporary shelter options (typically hotel/motel), cover staffing, and provide food and PPE.
- Contracted with hotels, staffing agencies and food supports to set up isolation spaces
- Partnered with local governments and nonprofits to create ongoing additional emergency shelter capacity for over 300 Minnesotans.
- Innovative use of Housing Support program to promote COVID-safe congregate settings and implement hotel-to-home model connecting people staying outdoors with permanent housing.

Homelessness is a public health crisis that is compounded by COVID-19.

- Create public-health informed recommendations for how the response to homelessness is implemented.
- Recognize and address the ways in which public health systems have not met the needs of indigenous communities or communities of color or have actively perpetuated harm.
- Formalize and strengthen connections between homeless response and local public health systems, particularly where Health Care for the Homeless programs do not operate.
- Expand Health Care for the Homeless programs and other similar interventions including behavioral health services.

We must center equity and implement anti-racist policies and practices.

- Frame and implement the response to homelessness as part of the response to racist policies and practices.
- Adopt and expand practices that shift funding, decision-making, and other forms of power to indigenous communities and communities of color.
- Be racially explicit and disaggregated in reporting the impact of funding decisions, program expectations, and program outcomes.

An accountability structure is needed for the homeless response system.

 Develop policy changes that clarify roles among levels of government for responding to homelessness, to increase accountability and partnership.

Rapid solutions are possible with adequate resources and staff capacity.

- Take what we have learned in these crises and build a plan and response system that is creative and adaptable.
- Sustain the sense of urgency and imperative for rapid action the problem deserves.
- Continue more intensive interagency work on solutions.

Stable and sustained funding to support shelter and outreach capacity and infrastructure is needed.

- Document the impact of these investments to motivate sustained investments.
- Model the true cost of responding to homelessness.
- Propose specific policies and budget options to create consistent and robust funding to sustain the homeless response on an ongoing basis.

Governor's Budget

- \$10 million increase for the **Emergency Services Program** to support emergency shelters, drop-in centers, and outreach programs.
- \$10 million increase for the **Community Living Infrastructure Grant program** for counties and tribes to integrate housing into their human services work.
- \$1 million to establish base funding for the Homelessness Management Information System (HMIS).
- \$6.3 million to support and expand Veteran homelessness efforts including housing vouchers and wrap around services.
- \$1 million increase for **Homework Starts with Home**, an evidence-based imitative that assists highly mobile families with school-aged children.
- \$4 million increase for the Family Homeless Prevention and Assistance Program which provides support services and short-term rental assistance, security deposits, and utility assistance to households who are homeless or an imminent risk of homelessness.
- \$500,000 increase in **Bridges**, the state's rental assistance program. This program supports people with serious mental illness live in integrated settings in their communities.
