### Investing in our infrastructure

#### Higher Education Asset Preservation and Replacement (HEAPR)

We must invest in the research, learning, and student-focused spaces that support the needs of our state well into the future. Unpredictable state investment has left nearly one-third of the University's roughly 33 million square feet of facilities statewide in poor or critical condition.



HEAPR (\$100M) will fund 50 projects in at least 45 buildings across Minnesota. With \$6 billion in facility needs, \$200 million a year would be required just to keep the backlog from growing. In research spaces, the lack of investment costs Minnesota dearly in federal reimbursements—between \$80 and \$90 million a year when compared to peers who have invested. HEAPR projects include:

- Crookston: Lysaker Gym foundation, electrical, and fire panel updates
- Duluth: HVAC, elevator, and electrical updates
- Morris: Cougar Sports Center safety upgrades, Briggs Library code improvements
- Twin Cities: Eddy Hall renewal, Moos Tower code, and safety updates

## Creating a central hub for St. Paul St. Paul Campus Center

The new St. Paul Campus Center will be a highly visible and welcoming destination that supports the daily needs of students, faculty, and staff and reflects the vitality, mission, and experience of St. Paul to all visitors to campus. It will combine new meeting and events spaces, teaching and learning areas, and retail and indoor and outdoor social spaces with student health services and a new St. Paul campus library.



The new Campus Center will replace the existing St. Paul Student Center and Magrath Library buildings and will connect to the Gortner parking ramp. This integration of multiple facilities and functions will enable campus-wide building efficiencies, create a dynamic space that fosters both academic excellence and social connections, and bring new vitality to the center of the St. Paul Campus.

## Modernizing Minnesota's only dental school Dentistry Clinical Renovation

The renovated dental space will advance education, training, and the patient experience for the only dental school in the state—that trains more than 70% of Minnesota's dentists and more than two-thirds of the state's dental hygienists and therapists, and sees more than 90,000 patients each year.



This renovation will comprehensively renovate several floors of Moos Tower used for clinical education and training space and heavily used by both dentistry students and patients. Modernized clinical spaces will advance learning, improve the experiences of patients, and make operations more efficient. They will make the University of Minnesota a competitive option for recruitment and retention, given that most other Big 10 schools have built state-of-the-art dental teaching and practice facilities within the past decade.
