Dear Members of the House and Senate Capital Investment Committees,

I am writing to ask you to support St. David's Center's request for general obligation bond funding (HF 244/SF 246). St. David's has been a trusted partner of Hennepin County for decades, currently with seven different contracts that provide a spectrum of services including Children's Mental Health Case Management, School Based Mental Health, Early Childhood Home Visiting, Inclusive Early Education and Care Coordination, as well as Reflective Supervision services to support county CPS Supervisors. These services reach county-involved families and children with complex mental health or developmental needs; they support foster and birth parents to develop healthy relationships with their children; and they leverage six decades of clinical expertise as one of our community's most reliable and skilled providers.

It is clear from data and from what we hear from those most affected that children's mental health needs are going unaddressed, and this crisis is only getting worse. Sixty-six percent of mental health providers are shrinking their current services due to inadequate Medicaid rates. This reduction in services is extremely concerning, especially because there are simply not enough services right now to sufficiently meet the needs of children and families who are bearing the brunt of the mental health crisis.

With their expansion into downtown Minneapolis, St. David's is taking a bold step to meet this urgent need by increasing capacity and access to services and focusing on supporting those communities that have historically experienced the greatest health disparities. Their new facility will undoubtedly fill a significant gap in our community, providing a safe, nurturing, and inclusive environment where children and families from all walks of life can thrive.

I am confident that St. David's can continue to be trusted to provide exceptional, accessible, high-quality care to those who need it most. Their mission and intention to increase capacity for prevention and early intervention services drives right to the heart of what we need as a state – an intentional investment in the well-being of our children and families.

Dear Members of the House and Senate Capital Investment Committees,

I am writing on behalf of the Hopkins Public School District to offer our support for HF 244/SF 246, St. David's Center's request for general obligation bond funding for renovation of the 1130 Nicollet Mall facility. St. David's Center's range of services is unique in our community, and they are a necessary part of our state's solution to address early childhood development. With this one-time investment of state resources, 2,000 more children and parents annually will have increased access to much-needed care, and the state will see decreased special education costs in both the short- and long-term through the provision of these early intervention services.

Hopkins School District has had a forty-year partnership with St. David's Center, beginning with collaborative care for children enrolled in their preschool program in the 1980s and our early childhood special education services and, as of a decade ago, extending to children's mental health services that help us address critical needs of our students and their families. St. David's Center is an invaluable asset to our six elementary schools and most recently opened two classrooms for early childhood autism treatment in our facility dedicated to families with young children; across the board, they provide a continuum of care that holistically supports our students.

As a public school superintendent, I see the full spectrum of children who enter our district, from those needing very little additional support to thrive all the way to children who struggle from the moment they enter formal education. If a child or family is seeking support, they may be waiting months to get an appointment as waiting lists for services are incredibly long. By not getting the support and care they need early on, children may experience an increase in behaviors which can have long-term impacts on both their educational and developmental outcomes. The gaps in services for immigrant communities and communities of color continues to be even more startling. St. David's Center's expansion is absolutely critical to address this crisis.

As members of St. David's Center's Capital Campaign Committee, we respectfully urge you to support HF 244/SF 246 for two reasons: 1) waiting lists for assessment and treatment for children's mental health, autism, and developmental delays are longer than ever, and 2) the public benefit resulting from St. David's expansion plan is significant and will save the state in both the short- and long-run.

We know that birth to five, and particularly the first three years of life, is the most critical window of brain development, and yet children across Minnesota are aging out of that window while they wait for services. The demand far outpaces supply, made worse by for- and non-profit organizations constricting, limiting access for families on Medicaid, or closing. St. David's has more than 2,100 young children currently waiting for developmental and mental health therapies. They have been out of space at their center in Minnetonka and smaller satellite clinic within Westminster Presbyterian Church in Minneapolis. After careful due diligence, their board and leadership took the bold step of purchasing a 105,000 square foot building on Nicollet Mall, formerly owned by the YWCA, with a vision to renovate it to be a solution for 2,000 more children and parents annually.

This request for general obligation bond funding is necessary for St. David's to reach more children. The project is shovel-ready as soon as funds are in place, with a design that transforms what has been mostly an underutilized fitness center into an early childhood center for young children who, with early intervention, will enter kindergarten without the need for intensive and costly school district services. We commend their board and leadership for their clarity, courage, and a deep commitment to improving outcomes for all children and decreasing disparities for low-income and BIPOC children. We are compelled by the unmet need and the lost potential, when an investment today could make all the difference.

As people working in Minnesota's business community, as parents, and as concerned community members, we value this organization's demonstrated success rate. We also clearly see not only the return on investment of \$10 million in bond funding when 2,000 Minnesota children and parents will be served annually into perpetuity, but also the immense public benefit in this investment: reduced special education costs, reduced academic remediation costs, reduces social services costs, reduced likelihood of juvenile delinquency and dropping

out, increased participation in the workforce, increased likelihood of continuing education, and improved lifelong health outcomes.

With nearly \$9 million raised to date, we are wholeheartedly committed to raising the additional \$13 million necessary to reflect the community will behind this expansion. However, philanthropy alone cannot cover the full cost. In order for St. David's to expand this significantly, they need both public and private support.

Access to these services will truly bend the trajectories of these children's and families' lives toward their full potential as community members for decades to come.

Thank you for considering St. David's request for general obligation bond funds. By supporting this important endeavor, we can all create a more vibrant and resilient community.
