



Historic Sites Network

- Statewide Presence of History Where It Happened
- Defined in statutes in M.S. 138.662
- Includes many of the state's most significant historic sites, including 140+ structures for which MNHS is responsible
- Important part of tourism economy -many out-of-state visitors
- Educational and affordable destination for families and school groups



The Minnesota Historical Society holds for the people of Minnesota, current and future generations:

- 340,361 photographs
- 501,724 publications
- 6,516 works of art
- 251,533 objects
- 50,300 cubic feet of manuscripts
- 60,000 cubic feet in State Archives, including 60 terabytes of digital records





Number of People Served

- Nearly one million in-person visits to historic sites and museums
- Includes nearly 200,000
 schoolchildren on organized
 programs to historic sites and
 museums
- Over 5 million visits to the Society's website www.mnhs.org





Statewide History Involvement and Participation

- 27,000 participants in History Day (many national award winners from Minnesota)
- 15,200 Members
- Volunteers make this all happen!

 Over 2,500 volunteers and interns contributing 71,000 hours and equivalent to 26 FTE.





MNHS COVID-19 IMPACTS

- Abrupt closure
- Revenue loss earned revenue
- Staffing reductions
- Pivot to digital delivery of programs and services
- Gradual reopening as conditions allow
- Maintenance of facilities and ongoing programs
- Strategic Planning effort


Minnesota Historical Society Budget FY20

Includes:

- \$23 million/year from state
 General Fund for FY20-21
- Overall operating budget approx.
 \$57 million all funds

- Contributions
- Memberships




Operations and Programs FY20

SOURCES OF SUPPORT AND REVENUE


0	Private contributions	10%

Operating Budget

Base budget:

\$23.518 million each year – General Fund

Initiatives for FY22-23:

Operating adjustment for compensation
 Gov's Rec. = \$1.1 million
