



The COVID Landscape

- Unemployment
 - 2 x higher rate than general population of US,
 - 4x higher rate than MN
- 21% had living situation impacted by pandemic
 - Number jumps to 38% for those over 21
 - 18-20 most concerned about future safety

Our June Survey

- Unemployment
 - 2 x higher rate than general population of US,
 - 4x higher rate than MN
- 21% had living situation impacted by pandemic
 - Number jumps to 38% for those over 21
 - 18-20 most concerned about future safety

Changes in Child Welfare Data

- Broadly, was a 22% drop in maltreatment reports and a 27% drop in investigations
- Drops in:
 - number of youth experiencing care
 - number of continuers
 - slight decrease in disparity rates
- Debate on whether this is evidence of hidden abuse or evidence of over investigation

Nothing to Celebrate

- Still at almost double the federal reentry into foster care standard
- Minnesota is below the federal standard requirement for monthly caseworker visits for enterers and continuers (before COVID challenges)

Emergency Support for Aging Out Fosters

2021 Appropriations Act

- Allows states to provide foster youth—who would otherwise age out during the pandemic—with the option to stay in care
- Allows youth who have aged out since January 27th, 2020 to voluntarily reenter care through the end of the public health emergency

- Removes the 30% cap in using Chafee funds for housing assistance
- Expands options for public housing authorities to allow using family unification program (FUP) vouchers for an additional 24 months for foster youth

Connection to Homelessness

The Venn Diagram

- Within 18 months of emancipation 40-50% of foster youth become homeless
- A history of foster care correlates with becoming homeless at an earlier age and remaining homeless for a longer period of time
- 65% of youth leaving foster care need immediate housing upon discharge

Minnesota Impact

- More locally, the youth homeless survey conducted in Hennepin County showed that 38% of our homeless-youth have gad experiences with foster care
- Our Hennepin Foster Survey:
 - 79% had ever experienced homelessness;
 - 14% actively homeless;
 - 35% had been homeless for a year or more
- 25% experienced homelessness in 2020 and 20% were currently couch surfing, sleeping in a car, or on the street at the time of the survey in December.
