

1.1 moves to amend H.F. No. 4387 as follows:

1.2 Page 6, after line 32, insert:

1.3 "Sec. 9. TASK FORCE ON DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND FIREARMS.

1.4 Subdivision 1. Establishment. The Task Force on Domestic Violence and Firearms is
1.5 established to review existing laws that require the surrender of firearms by individuals
1.6 subject to an order for protection, subject to an extreme risk protection order, or convicted
1.7 of domestic assault, harassment, or stalking; identify best practices to ensure the surrender
1.8 of firearms that prioritize the safety of peace officers, victims, and others; identify policies
1.9 and procedures that reduce the danger to peace officers and other emergency responders
1.10 called to an incident involving domestic violence; and make policy and funding
1.11 recommendations to the legislature.

1.12 Subd. 2. Membership. (a) The task force consists of the following members:

1.13 (1) the commissioner of public safety, or a designee;

1.14 (2) the director of the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Relatives Office, or a designee;

1.15 (3) the chief justice, or a designee;

1.16 (4) the state public defender, or a designee;

1.17 (5) a county attorney appointed by the Minnesota County Attorneys Association;

1.18 (6) an individual appointed by the Indian Affairs Council;

1.19 (7) a peace officer, as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 626.84, subdivision 1,
1.20 paragraph (c), appointed by the Minnesota Chiefs of Police Association;

1.21 (8) a peace officer, as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 626.84, subdivision 1,
1.22 paragraph (c), appointed by the Minnesota Sheriffs' Association;

- 2.1 (9) an individual appointed by Violence Free Minnesota;
2.2 (10) an individual appointed by Minnesota Coalition Against Sexual Assault; and
2.3 (11) an individual appointed by the Gun Violence Prevention Law Clinic at the University
2.4 of Minnesota Law School.

2.5 (b) Appointments must be made no later than September 1, 2024.

2.6 (c) Members shall serve without compensation.

2.7 (d) Members of the task force serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority or until
2.8 the task force expires. Vacancies shall be filled by the appointing authority consistent with
2.9 the qualifications of the vacating member required by this subdivision.

2.10 Subd. 3. **Officers; meetings.** (a) The commissioner of public safety shall convene the
2.11 first meeting of the task force no later than September 15, 2024, and shall provide meeting
2.12 space and administrative assistance for the task force to conduct its work.

2.13 (b) At its first meeting, the task force must elect a chair and vice-chair from among its
2.14 members. The task force may elect other officers as necessary.

2.15 (c) The task force shall meet at least monthly or upon the call of the chair. The task force
2.16 shall meet sufficiently enough to accomplish the tasks identified in this section. Meetings
2.17 of the task force are subject to Minnesota Statutes, chapter 13D.

2.18 Subd. 4. **Duties.** (a) The task force shall, at a minimum:

2.19 (1) review relevant information regarding the intersection between domestic violence
2.20 and firearm violence;

2.21 (2) examine existing laws requiring the surrender of firearms by individuals subject to
2.22 orders for protection, convicted of domestic assault, and convicted of harassment or stalking;

2.23 (3) examine existing policies and procedures, if any, used in Minnesota to enforce orders
2.24 requiring the surrender of firearms by individuals subject to an order for protection or
2.25 convicted of domestic assault, harassment, or stalking;

2.26 (4) examine laws, policies, and procedures in other states related to enforcing orders
2.27 requiring the surrender of firearms;

2.28 (5) identify barriers to enforcing orders in Minnesota that require the surrender of firearms
2.29 by individuals subject to an order for protection or convicted of domestic assault, harassment,
2.30 or stalking;

3.1 (6) identify best practices for enforcing orders requiring the surrender of firearms,
3.2 prioritizing practices that protect the safety of peace officers, prosecutors, judges and court
3.3 staff, victims, and others;

3.4 (7) identify policies and procedures that reduce the danger to peace officers and other
3.5 emergency responders called to an incident involving domestic violence; and

3.6 (8) make policy and funding recommendations to the legislature.

3.7 (b) At its discretion, the task force may examine other issues consistent with this section.

3.8 Subd. 5. **Recommendations; report.** The task force may issue recommendations and
3.9 reports at any time during its existence. By February 1, 2025, the task force must submit a
3.10 report to the chairs and ranking minority members of the house of representatives and senate
3.11 committees and divisions with jurisdiction over public safety finance and policy on the
3.12 findings and recommendations of the task force.

3.13 Subd. 6. **Expiration.** The task force expires the day after submitting its report under
3.14 subdivision 5."
