### 3. Support for families of Indigenous people with FASD

a. Our Children Are Sacred App

The Our Children Are Sacred app is designed to support Native American families, helping them to remain healthy and deeply connected to their tribal ways. All of the content on the app, including

videos, songs, imagery and written word, is created through the invaluable insight and guidance of our co-creation team and Indigenous content creators from all over the country who are passionate about supporting and empowering their communities.

App content covers topics like the basics of FASD, FASD in Indigenous communities, traditional teachings, trauma and its impact on mental health and cultural support available to families. There's an entire content section called Returning to Culture that includes traditional teaching from Elders, self-care practices, songs and stories, encouraging words and phrases in different Indigenous languages, and information about ceremonies and other traditional practices.

## 4. Education for health providers on FASD and provision of culturally informed care for Indigenous patients

- a. A course on our Learning Management System: Effective Communication Tools for American Indian Patients
- b. Clinical-Academic Partnership with St. Catherine's University School of Nursing: Nursing student rotation at the Proof Alliance FASD Diagnostic Clinic to learn about FASD diagnosis and care coordination for families of Indigenous children diagnosed with FASD
- c. SAFEST Choice Learning Collaborative: tribal clinic teams and community health clinics learn about screening for prenatal alcohol exposure and FASD within prenatal and pediatric practices. Past and current clinics that serve primarily Indigenous patients include:
  - Minnesota: Indian Health Board, Mino-Bimaadiziwin Red Lake Wellness Clinic
  - Other states: South Dakota Urban Indian Health, Fort Thompson Indian Health Services, Lower Brule Indian Health Services (SD), Pokagon Health Services Clinic (MI), Passamaquoddy Health Center (ME)
