Gain recognition as a premier regional resource to host events that bring people together to collectively find solutions and increase human connection.







2021-23 Applicants (to-date)








Prior Biennium vs. Current Biennium Cultural Heritage Grants

Current First Year of Biennium


Awarded \$2,375,000
