<b>Solicitation near polling place</b>	H.F. 205	Updates the prohibition on campaigning or soliciting near a polling place on election day to reflect recent U.S. Supreme Court decision.	110

<b>Expansion of laws impacting voter registration</b>	H.F. 3	Permits voter preregistration by individuals ages 16 and 17, authorizes automatic voter registration in certain circumstances, and establishes a permanent absentee voter list that would automatically provide an absentee ballot, rather than an absentee ballot application, prior to each election.	1-19

<b>Multilingual election judges; voter intimidation</b>	H.F. 3	Requires voting instructions and sample ballots to be provided in languages other than English in certain qualifying precincts; requires multilingual election judges to be stationed in certain qualifying precincts; and establishes civil and criminal remedies for engaging in acts of intimidation and other related actions that interfere with a voter's efforts to cast a ballot or assist others in voting.	1-3
