The One Minnesota Budget - focusing on our future by focusing on our children! Community Resource Centers play a critical role assuring access to community-based support and services so all children can grow in safe, strong, and healthy families.

Community Resource Centers (CRCs) are **centralized community access points** for individuals and families to seek relationship-based and culturally responsive support, reducing isolation and building **strong, healthy, successful families**.

Over 30 CRC sites¹ are already operating across the state. Investing in a network of CRCs will **knit together existing community resources to sustain and grow coordinated support** for Minnesota children and families.





CRC support for children and families looks like:

- Local, community-driven in-person support, care, and network of resources - from preventative services to a continuum of care
- Rooted in research-based Strengthening Families Protective Factors² and the learnings from Community Resource Hub and Family Resource Center grants
- Centering **community members and those with lived experience** to meet community-specific needs and offer culturally responsive services
- **Connecting** all residents with basic needs such as housing, food, and care
- **Multiple ways of accessing services** through inperson visits or virtual tools like <u>Help Me Connect</u>

Support statewide access to this critical network.

What the Research Shows

Using a multi-generational, strengths-based, and family-centered approach, CRCs have been shown to impact the following areas³:

Reductions in:

- Out of home placements
- Community-level child abuse investigations
- Disparities, especially in BIPOC communities

Increases in:

- Economic self-sufficiency
- Health
- Social support
- Children's educational success
- Family functioning and resiliency
