Overview

This bill requires all beer kegs sold by off-sale retailers to have an identification number that is recorded by the retailer, along with the buyer's identification, at the time of sale. It prohibits anyone other than a wholesaler or retailer from possessing a beer keg without the required identification.

Section

1 **Sale of beer kegs.** Requires beer kegs to be identified and recorded before being sold by off-sale retailers.

Subd. 1. Definitions. Defines "beer keg" as a brewery-sealed container holding at least seven gallons of beer. Defines "off-sale retailer" to include licensees and municipal liquor stores.

Subd. 2. Standards. Prohibits off-sale retail sales of keg beer without an identification label or tag. Specifies the material, manner of attachment, and required identification information.

Subd. 3. Identification required. Prohibits an off-sale retailer from selling a beer keg unless it has identification attached to it.

Subd. 4. Records. Requires an off-sale retailer who sells a beer keg to record:

(1) the number of the buyer's driver's license, Minnesota identification card, military identification card, or valid passport.

- (2) the date and time of the purchase;
- (3) the keg identification number; and

(4) the purchaser's signature.

Requires the record to be kept by the retailer for at least 90 days after the date of sale.

Subd. 5. Access to records. Requires off-sale retailers to make their keg sale registers available during business hours for inspection by a peace officer or a department of public safety agent. **Subd. 6.** Violations. Prohibits a person required to record keg sales in a book or register from

knowingly making a materially false entry. Allows a defense of reasonable and good faith reliance on the identification provided

If anyone other than a wholesaler or retailer possesses a beer keg that does not have the required identification, the keg is considered contraband and subject to seizure by law enforcement or public safety.
