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Subject: Bicyclists at red lights

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Establishes an affirmative defense for a bicyclist who enters or crosses an intersection against a red light if the bicyclist establishes the following in response to the charge:

- (1) the bicycle has been brought to a complete stop;
- (2) the signal shows red for an unreasonable time;
- (3) the signal is apparently malfunctioning or, if vehicle-activated, has not detected the bicycle; and
- (4) no other vehicle or person is approaching on the street or is near enough to pose a hazard.

Specifies that this defense applies only to a charge of going through a red light, and does not apply in any other civil or criminal action.

The legislature created the related affirmative defense for motorcyclists in 2002.
