Overview

This bill creates a system for specific types of organizations (such as private motor carrier businesses, bus companies, and school districts) to provide third-party skill and road testing for a commercial driver's license or a motorcycle endorsement. It sets eligibility and certification requirements for the entities as well as for individual testers that administer the exams, and establishes various related administrative provisions.

Section

- 1 Commercial driver's license. Defines "commercial driver's license" in the chapter on driver licensing, to use a definition in federal regulations.
- 2 Third-party tester. Defines "third-party tester" in the chapter on driver licensing to be an individual who is certified by the Department of Public Safety to administer road or skills driver licensing tests.
- **Third-party testing program.** Defines "third-party testing program" in the chapter on driver licensing to be an organization or entity that is authorized to administer road or skills driver licensing tests.
- 4 [171.1615] Third-party testing program eligibility. Establishes eligibility requirements for each type of entity that can administer a program of third-party driver's license testing. Provides for eligibility of the following entities to create a third-party testing program:
 - motor carriers
 - school bus companies

 public postsecondary schools (under the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities system or under North Central Association of Colleges and Schools)

- school districts
- nonprofits administering motorcycle safety courses
- transit authorities

Depending on the entity, the driver taking a test must either be an employee of that entity or an enrolled student (or in some situations an employee of another school district or bus company).

- 5 **[171.1616] Third-party tester qualifications.** Establishes requirements for an individual to be a third-party tester and administer road and skills examinations.
 - **Subd. 1. Generally.** Sets general requirements for certification as a third-party tester, including possession of the appropriate driver's license for the type of vehicle for which tests would be administered, employment by an entity that provides third-party testing, and completion of the same training in administering the test as is required of state employees.
 - **Subd. 2. State employee.** Prohibits state employees from being third-party testers.
 - **Subd. 3. Driver education instructor.** Prohibits driver's education instructors from being third-party testers, except for motorcycle driver education programs.
 - **Subd. 4. Motorcycle tester qualifications.** Requires Motorcycle Safety Foundation instructor certification, under specified 2001 standards, in order for a person to be a third-party tester for a motorcycle endorsement.
 - **Subd. 5. Employment.** Permits an individual to be employed by more than one entity that provides third-party testing, and requires the individual to have a certificate for each testing program.
 - **Subd. 6. Maintaining certification.** Establishes requirements for an individual to continue being certified as a third-party tester.
- **[171.1617] Test administration.** Establishes various administrative provisions that govern third-party driver testing.
 - **Subd. 1. Requirements.** Makes the road and skills tests subject to requirements set in administrative rules.
 - **Subd. 2. Third-party tester restrictions.** Restricts to whom a third-party tester can administer a test, prohibits delegating test administration, and limits the test fee to no more than \$100.
 - **Subd. 3. Repeat test limit.** Permits a second road or skills test following a failed test if specified requirements are met and prevents a third-party tester from administering third or subsequent testing attempts.
 - **Subd. 4. Bilateral agreements.** Permits school districts qualified for third-party testing to enter into an agreement to test employees of other districts who are part of

the agreement, subject to approval by the Department of Public Safety. The same agreement mechanism also applies to school busing companies.

Subd. 5. Testing contingencies. Makes third-party driver's license test passage conditional on some requirements being met, and authorizes retesting by a state examiner under some circumstances.
