

- Subject Salon licensure and continuing education
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Overview

This bill provides a number of miscellaneous changes to salon licensing and continuing education laws. These laws are within the jurisdiction of the Board of Cosmetology.

Summary

Section Description

1 Salon.

Modifies the definition of "salon" to include spaces that function to offer and provide personal services by practitioners.

2 Salon franchisor.

Establishes a definition of "salon franchisor," for use later in the bill.

3 Professional association.

Establishes a definition of "professional association," for use later in the bill.

4 **Continuing education requirements.**

Requires continuing education courses to include information regarding resources available to individuals affected by domestic abuse and violence (subd. 1).

Board approval of professional associations to offer continuing education instruction is limited to only those associations that are domiciled in Minnesota (subd. 2).

Board-recognized salon franchisors domiciled in Minnesota are newly permitted to offer continuing education to their employees and franchisee employees (subd. 2).

Web-based continuing education may only be offered by schools, professional associations, and salon franchisors that are approved by the board. The board must have unrestricted access to any web-based class offering (subd. 2).

Section Description

Standards for the board to revoke authorizations, and restrictions on the promotion or sale of cosmetology-related products during a class are also provided (subd. 2).

Records retention requirements continue to apply even if a provider ceases to offer continuing education instruction (subd. 3).

Miscellaneous changes to auditing procedures for active licensees and continuing education providers are provided. Among the substantive changes is a new requirement, replacing a permissive authority, for the board to request that a continuing education provider verify a licensee's credits (subd. 4).

5 Licensing.

Prohibits a person from actually providing regulated cosmetology services for compensation unless the services are provided by a person licensed by the board, and in a salon licensed by the board. Current law only prohibits these services from being "offered."



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
